I can remember wonderful long days at the beach in my mom's home town of Bay St. Louis, Missisippi. We'd have bonfires on the beach some evenings while we went floundering and then cleaned and grilled them fresh out of the water. The best was the big shrimp and crab boils my aunt used to have from what we netted crabbing off the seawall or bought directly from the shrimping boats when they returned to dock. The whole family would gather around big tables covered with newspapers and my Aunt Mat would bring huge batches of fresh blue crab and gulf shrimp, boiled to perfection with just the right spices. Then we would top off this grand feast with ice cold watermelon and a seed spitting contest. What great memories I have - not a care in the world, which is how it should be when you are a child.

But thousands of children in southwest Ohio can't wait for summer to end because they know at school they will get a good meal or two, at least during the week. But what about the weekends? That's where the BackPack Program becomes a critical component for these students to have a successful academic year. The BackPack Program provides enough wholesome food for thousands of children to eat on the weekends so they can return to school on Mondays hungry to learn instead of hungry for food.

Intervening in these young children's lives with something as simple as a bag of food each weekend, gives them the energy, acuity and inspiration to participate on par with their better fed peers, improving attendance, classroom participation and academic achievement. It is not often we have the opportunity to really improve the lives of children who face multiple obstacles – in the long run this small investment can help them grow into healthy, caring and responsible adults. And then maybe they can make great summertime memories with their own kids.







ELLEN'S STORY

It is sometimes difficult to make sure I have food for everybody in my family. I have skipped meals to make sure my kids have enough food. Every night, I'm the last one to eat because by the time I finish making their plates they're asking for seconds. They come first; I come second. A lot of times, it's come down to being short \$50 to \$100 on a bill to make sure I have enough milk, enough meat, enough vegetables to make sure they have a balanced meal. If this program did not exist, then my bills would always be late. It would be very stressful, very hard. For me, it helps bridge that gap and I can make sure all my bills are paid because I don't have to make sure I have enough food for everybody.

BACKPACK FILLS A NEED




